Neutering News

We cannot emphasise enough the critical importance of spaying and neutering: it lies at the very heart of our mission. While a litter of puppies may appear cute in photos shared on social media, and we do manage to find homes for some of them, the reality is that thousands more face a much darker fate. Many suffer from preventable diseases, fall victim to traffic accidents or are sent to public shelters, where they endure short, harsh lives. The only real, long-term solution to this problem is neutering, as it stops millions of unwanted animals from being born into a life of misery.

Though it's not the easiest sell on our social media, neutering is the most essential and impactful action we can take. It prevents countless animals from experiencing needless suffering. Ultimately, while it may not be glamorous, it is by far the most powerful tool we have to create lasting change for animal welfare.





So we're thrilled to announce that between July and September 2024, we managed to neuter a fantastic 628 dogs in rural Romania! Our August campaign saw word spreading as people brought their own pets to be spayed. and our September Spay a Stray is focusing on females, like the girl who was found in a cemetery and became spay number 7. Sometime we discover dogs in terrible situations, such as this poor boy who had been tied with string that had dug into him. Of course we rescued him and ensured he had the vet treatment he needed.

New Project News!

Exciting announcement klaxon! We are absolutely over the moon to share the news of our latest project, which will span the next 3 to 5 years. Thanks to our patron Ricky Gervais, who generously donated funds to us following his Armageddon World Tour, we have acquired a beautiful piece of land just north of Bucharest.

This gated plot features large buildings and will be transformed into a centre that includes facilities for horses, a vet clinic for dogs and small animals and a neutering clinic. The site boasts two sizeable buildings, smaller houses, a tractor store, stables and even a former distillery! Our ambitious future plans also include training and education facilities.

Currently, there are no similar clinics within at least a four-hour drive, making this a vital resource for communities and rescuers in rural Romania. As you can imagine, there is a tremendous amount of work ahead of us! The site also features a UNESCO Heritage well that will require some specialist attention and will provide fresh spring water.

Once we complete the planning phases, we will be reaching out for builders and volunteers to join us. If you know any construction workers who might be interested in a unique holiday experience, please let us know!

A massive thank you to Ricky Gervais for turning the dreams of Paws2Rescue and Save the Horses Romania into a reality and for his unwavering support for animals worldwide. This is a dream we have been eager to pursue for over two years. We also extend our gratitude to everyone who supports our efforts as we create lasting change for animals across Romania and for your contributions to this exciting project.








Canine Brucellosis Research Update

Paws2Rescue is committed to promoting evidence-based measures that safeguard animal welfare. We advocate for proactive approaches such as thorough screening, spaying, neutering, and isolating positive cases to prevent the spread of brucellosis. Since late 2023, we have been sending blood samples from adopted dogs to the state-of-the-art APHA laboratory in the UK for testing prior to their departure from Romania.

In our last newsletter, we talked about our research programme and we are pleased to say our brucellosis research project in Romania was presented at the World Health Conference in South Africa in September by Dr Mada Lixandru, one of our Paws2Rescue vets who is specialising in disease research.

International Homeless Animal Day











Sanctuary Update

Our Sacred Hearts Sanctuary has been a long-held dream and we are thrilled to announce that it is now finished. The second half of the project has now been completed, with solar panels installed and the exterior freshly painted. We now have the capacity to welcome 100 dogs and to provide them with a safe haven.

New arrivals will be placed in quarantine until their blood test results arrive, allowing us to assess their health and needs properly. While some of our dogs can be rehomed, there are sadly others who are simply too traumatised to thrive in a typical household. However, at the Sanctuary, these dogs will finally experience happiness and love for the first time in their lives.

Our Sanctuary enables us to continue rescuing dogs from the dreadful conditions of public shelters, offering them the freedom and safety they deserve. We would like to extend our heartfelt gratitude to all our supporters who have made this incredible achievement possible. Celebrating Our New and Existing Vet Scholars





Lending a Helping Paw in Ukraine

We are sad to share the devastating news that, once again, Irina's shelter in Zaporozhye, Ukraine, has come under attack. At the end of September, the shelter was shelled, leaving many of the 500 plus animals in a state of shock, injury, and deep trauma. This is not the first time Irina's shelter has faced such a terrifying ordeal in the ongoing conflict, and each incident leaves behind more wounded animals and shattered lives. They have had to take all the animals out of the vet clinic and are talking to them about what more we can do to help.

In the wake of this latest attack, we have sent emergency donations to cover the mounting veterinary bills and provide urgent care for the injured animals. The toll this takes on the animals, as well as on the shelter staff who care for them day in and day out under such difficult circumstances, is unimaginable. These animals, already vulnerable, now face even more suffering as a result of the violence surrounding them.

Our hearts go out to everyone affected by this senseless violence and we stand in solidarity with Irina, her shelter, and the brave animals that have endured so much. We can't show images of the shelter as they are too traumatic, but here are two of the lovely dogs we have already evacuated to the safety of the Sanctuary.









All our dogs are special, but occasionally, we come across one who has been so profoundly let down and mistreated by humans that they tug extra hard on our heartstrings. Gamila is one such dog. Shot in the face in Cairo, Egypt, she sustained catastrophic injuries and many suggested that the kindest option would be to have her put to sleep. However, having encountered dogs with similar injuries before, we knew there was a possibility she could be helped.

Thanks to the kindness of our supporters, who were as heartbroken and outraged as we were, we successfully raised the funds needed for the surgery that Gamila so desperately required. We are pleased to share that she has made a remarkable recovery and to top it off, has found a loving forever home in Germany.
