A New Year has arrived, and our commitment to neutering remains as strong as ever. February 25th was designated World Spay Day and our incredible team and dedicated rescuers across Romania came together to neuter animals as part of our ongoing mission at Paws2Rescue. Every single animal operated on had a safe, warm place to recover; a vital part of responsible neutering.

This beautiful stray girl, found waiting outside school gates, was one of many spayed through our Spay A Stray campaign. Across the country, over 100 animals were neutered in just one day.

At Paws2Rescue, neutering is at the very heart of what we do. It's not just a one-day effort as our campaigns run throughout the year, aiming to break the cycle of suffering for stray and unwanted animals. By preventing unwanted litters, we reduce abandonment, neglect and the number of animals struggling to survive on the streets..

Our Spay A Stray campaign is back for 2025—one dog at a time, straight from the streets. We're working to reduce the stray dog population in western Romania through free neutering, and every dog we help is a step closer to long-term change.

Since we began spaying in 2014, we've neutered over 19,000 animals, thanks entirely to the generosity of our supporters and the hard graft of our teams on the ground. This vital work is only possible through donations, and we're so grateful to everyone who helps make it happen.

Positive News From Romania!

FANTASTIC FOOTBALLERS

For decades, stray animals were seen as pests in Romania, but attitudes are changing. Following the example of football teams in Cluj and Bucharest, we now see footballers in Arad bringing shelter puppies onto the pitch. This shift in perception is a sign of progress, which is why Paws2Rescue's Schools Programme and outreach vet and neutering services will continue to promote animal welfare and compassion in rural areas. We want to work with Romania, not just in Romania.

Romania's stray dog problem is complex and worsened in the 1970s with urbanisation, leading to widespread pet abandonment as people moved into smaller homes. Strays bred freely and their numbers spiralled out of control. In the early 2000s, controversial dog culls failed to address the issue. While legislation now prevents stray dogs from being returned to the streets after capture, overcrowded shelters remain underresourced and many dogs still live on the streets, un-neutered and at risk of disease, injury, starvation or euthanasia. We're working hard to change this and we're thrilled to see the footballers are too!



ROMANIAN INNOVATION

It may come as a surprise to learn Romania is leading the way with an innovative solution to feeding strays in the capital via the introduction of stray feeding posts in three parks in Bucharest. When an empty plastic bottle is inserted for recycling, food and water are dispensed for stray cats. It's a brilliant initiative and now we need the rest of Europe to follow suit.



BETTER SHELTERS

It has been incredibly uplifting to witness the gradual yet significant improvements in the conditions for stray and abandoned dogs in Romania. For years, the stories have been a mix of heartbreak and hope, but the balance is finally shifting towards a more positive future. While the road ahead is still long, small but meaningful changes are taking place across various counties and the difference is becoming increasingly noticeable.

One such example is the Suceava Public Shelter, a local government-run facility that is proving that change is possible. While we all know a shelter can never replace a home, this facility is transforming the lives of countless dogs. Play areas have been introduced, providing much-needed space for the dogs to stretch their legs and socialise. Hundreds of new dog houses have been built, offering shelter and warmth and there's been a consistent increase in the quality of care, with canned meat being provided more regularly and radiators in the recovery room for those in need of extra comfort.

Vaccinations and neutering are now part of the regular routine, which is a massive step forward in the fight against overpopulation and disease. A new website has been launched, dedicated to promoting adoptions and volunteers are stepping in to walk the dogs, giving them much-needed social interaction and exercise. Perhaps most encouraging of all is the visible support from the Mayor, who regularly visits the shelter and lends his backing to these positive changes.

These improvements are happening across Romania, albeit slowly, but each step forward represents progress. The balance between the negative and positive stories is finally tilting towards hope, and we are absolutely thrilled to see the changes unfold. It's a heartwarming sight to those of us who have campaigned for and educated local leaders and politicians about the need for better shelters for stray animals across the country.

A MIRACLE FOR ALIS

When we first found Alis, she was in a horrific state. Left lying in the grass, unable to move, with no food or water, she had been brutally beaten and was suffering from a severe leg injury. Her face, neck and body were covered in wounds, some inflicted by human hands, others from dog bites. The blackened areas on her body showed where the wounds had turned necrotic. At around 10 years old, she was lying there, waiting to die from the intense pain, her eyes filled with sadness and her spirit broken.

Alis was rushed to the vet, where the full extent of her condition became clear. Unfortunately, her blood tests revealed an infection caused by untreated wounds and pancreatitis. She was in critical condition, and we honestly didn't think she'd have the strength to survive. It was touch and go and our hearts broke for this sweet, innocent girl who had suffered so much cruelty.

But Alis is a true fighter. With the help of a dedicated veterinary team, she began her long road to recovery. She was put on medication and an intravenous drip, and although she wasn't eating at first, we held onto hope. Gradually, she began to eat and show small signs of improvement. To see her lift her head, smile and brighten up even a little was a real turning point.

As the weeks passed, Alis continued to fight. The vet confirmed she had one broken leg, but thankfully, the others were intact. She still had a long road ahead of her, but with each passing day, she grew stronger. Her wounds began to heal, and the sadness in her eyes slowly faded. To see her smile once again meant the world to us and we all fell in love with this very special senior.

Our prayers for her recovery were answered and now we're praying she can find her forever home. At the age of 10, she has proven that age and hardship can be overcome with resilience and love. She's a gentle soul who deserves to spend her golden years in peace and comfort, surrounded by a family who will cherish her.
